GENERAL.

In presenting this, the 5th "civilian" issue of "The Echo," the Committee feels that it can anticipate the approbation of members for another good year in our record.

It will be noted that Mr. H. F. Vawdon has been elected President after being a member of the Committee since its inception in 1918.

Harold has always been a keen worker for the Association, and his election to the office of President is only fitting. It is proposed

that that office should now be filled in rotation, annually.

Another change was the enlargement of the Committee to 15 members. It was considered that the greater number would widen the scope of opinion on matters affecting the conduct of the Association.

ANZAC DAY MARCH.

As this issue will be posted to all members before Anzac Day, we can give some information about the assembly for the March.

We made a suggestion to the Commemoration Council that the rendezvous for the various 1st AIF units be made permanent, but we have been advised that in view of the periodical changes in the order of the March, this is not practicable.

This year the R.A.A.F. will lead the March and accordingly all units will be moved around so as to facilitate the moving off.

Our assembly points will be in Russell Street, at the corner of Little Lansdale Street, east side.

Should any change be made in this plan, it will be announced in the daily press.

Members are requested to be on parade early, so that full advantage will be taken of the opportunity of meeting one another and having a yarn together before we move off.

Watch the daily papers for starting time of the March and the order of the divisions.

Battalion buttons will be available again at the usual price of 1/- The purchase of one of these buttons constitutes the annual membership fee, and is a privilege available only to 22nd Battalion members.

HOSPITALIZATION.

Two visits to Caulfield Repatriation Hospital were made during the year, one on August 4th and the other, a special Christmas visit, on December 17th.

For the August visit, 10 of our members met at the Hospital at 7 p.m. on Saturday, August 4th, and visited every patient—approximately 100—and distributed cigarettes, oranges and reading matter to each.

For the December visit, every one of the 100 inmates was given a small packet containing cigarettes, Koolmints and a special Christmas card with greetings from the Association. From the many expressions of appreciation of the recipients, we can feel gratified that our visit was accepted in the spirit in which it was made.

Three of our members were inmates at the time of our visits: F. E. G. O'Brien, F. Capuano and Mick Dawson. Frank O'Brien has since been discharged.

1948 RE-UNION.

The attendance at our 1948 Re-union was a sure indication of the members' appreciation of these functions. We were so gratified

with the success of our 1947 effort that it was considered a repetition on similar lines for 1948 was all that was required.

Our anticipations were realized for over 200 attended and made the most of the opportunity of meeting old comrades and recounting past experiences.

As the financial statement in "The Echo" shows, we showed a profit of £10/15/6. Very creditable, no doubt, but the result was achieved by the support of absentee members who like to feel they are at the show by donating. As a small recognition of their support, the following list is published, with running commentary on each of them.

The ability of the troops in consuming the "comforts" provided has in no way diminished, and the caterer has no worry about disposal of surplus food. In fact, at the end of the show, only the tables were left.

It reflects to our credit that we had no claim for breakages or any damage to the Town Hall. Many years ago we conducted a Re-union in that room and only by the proper measure of "wangling" did we escape the penalty of damages to the building caused by escaped liquid.
